

The Healing of the Paralytic March 30, 2025

Sunday's Gospel presents the healing of the paralytic, a miracle that stands out among the many others we read about during Lent. The leper approached Jesus and asked to be healed, and the hemorrhaging woman stole a miracle by touching Jesus's cloak. However, today's story is entirely different.

In this passage, the paralytic does not speak or ask to be healed. Yet, the Gospel tells us: "When Jesus saw their faith, he said to the paralytic, 'Child, your sins are forgiven." This raises an important question: can we see faith? Is faith something tangible, something we can touch or see with our eyes? Certainly not! While we do not physically see faith, we can witness it through the actions of a believing man or woman. That is precisely what happened in this story. Jesus saw the faith of these men who, undeterred by obstacles, opened the roof above Him and lowered the paralytic down on his mat.





The crowd did not stop them. They were determined to bring their friend to Jesus, knowing that He alone could heal him. Nothing hindered their resolve to reach the Lord. This teaches us that the journey of faith is not always easy, but if we persevere, we will ultimately arrive at Jesus.

Perhaps they were surprised by Jesus' response: "Your sins are forgiven." Maybe they silently thought, "What is He saying? We brought him here to walk again!" Their immediate concern was physical healing, restoring mobility, independence, and dignity. Yet, for Jesus, the most important thing was spiritual healing, reconciliation with God, and, ultimately, eternal salvation. Healing the soul is far greater than healing the body. A healed body may grant someone 10 or 15 more years of life, but a healed soul promises eternal life in heaven.

This Gospel invites us to reflect deeply on the role of the four men who carried the paralytic. They represent the community of the Church, a community that leads people to Christ. The Church, through its witness, helps others encounter Jesus. However, an essential truth about this community is that it is not perfect. Despite its imperfections, the Church carries us to Jesus. No one on this earth is perfect. Together, as a community, we pray the Our Father, and with one voice, we profess our faith in one God. The Church is not an exclusive club for the elite; it is a spiritual hospital for the sick, a place where all people, in their brokenness, can find healing through Christ.

CATECHISM OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH

LITURGICAL CELEBRATIONS

Various forms of sacramentals

Among sacramentals blessings (of persons, meals, objects, and places) come first. Every blessing praises God and prays for his gifts. In Christ, Christians are blessed by God the Father "with every spiritual blessing." This is why the Church imparts blessings by invoking the name of Jesus, usually while making the holy sign of the cross of Christ.

Certain blessings have a lasting importance because they consecrate persons to God, or reserve objects and places for liturgical use. Among those blessings which are intended for persons - not to be confused with sacramental ordination - are the blessing of the abbot or abbess of a monastery, the consecration of virgins, the rite of religious profession and the blessing of certain ministries of the Church (readers, acolytes, catechists, etc.). the dedication or blessing of a church or an altar, the blessing of holy oils, vessels, and vestments, bells, etc., can be mentioned as examples of blessings that concern objects.

When the Church asks publicly and authoritatively in the name of Jesus Christ that a person or object be protected against the power of the Evil One and withdrawn from his dominion, it is called exorcism. Jesus performed exorcisms and from him the Church has received the power and office of exorcizing. In a simple form, exorcism is performed at the celebration of Baptism. the solemn exorcism, called "a major exorcism," can be performed only by a priest and with the permission of the bishop. the priest must proceed with prudence, strictly observing the rules established by the Church. Exorcism is directed at the expulsion of demons or to the liberation from demonic possession through the spiritual authority which Jesus entrusted to his Church. Illness, especially psychological illness, is a very different matter; treating this is the concern of medical science. Therefore, before an exorcism is performed, it is important to ascertain that one is dealing with the presence of the Evil One, and not an illness.
